TWIN CREEKS MYOBATRACHIDAE GROUND FROGS

No Tree Frogs (Hylidae) were captured during this survey. If they did happen to fall into a Pit Trap they would probably have easily jumped out anyway so the survey doesn't suggest that there are no Tree Frogs at Twin Creeks. All the frogs that were captured were Ground Frogs.
